Student Partnership Agreement

Introduction

The purpose of this agreement is to outline the partnership between New College Lanarkshire and New College Lanarkshire Students' Association (NCLSA). Both parties want to build upon our existing strengths in working together to further enhance the student experience at the College. New College Lanarkshire values the involvement and partnership working with the Students' Association, class representatives and individual learners who contribute to the life and work of the college. In doing so, New College Lanarkshire will support and empower all learners to achieve their goals and realise their potential. All staff have a responsibility to effectively engage with and support learners which includes listening to and acting upon the learner voice. (New College Lanarkshire Learner Engagement and Support Strategy 2018–2023)

This agreement details our agreed priorities for the academic year 2018 – 19 and our future priorities.

The development process of this agreement has included building upon the work undertaken by New College Lanarkshire and the Students' Association in the development of this Learner Engagement and Support Strategy, Be Heard events, focus groups and feedback sessions with NCLSA representatives, learners and staff.

This agreement should be read in conjunction with the Regional Outcome Agreement and other strategic documents, however learners are not restricted by this agreement – learners are actively encouraged to tell NCLSA and the College how they can make learning experience and time at College better in any way. This agreement has been established to maintain and encourage the developing bond between NCLSA and the College and to reinforce the College's commitment to learner engagement and the learner voice.

The College Community

New College Lanarkshire's Learner Engagement and Support Strategy sets out our priorities, expectations and commitments for encouraging and engaging learners which are linked to the strategic themes of:

- Learners feeling part of a supportive institution
- Learners being supported to engage in their own learner journey
- Learners partaking in a high quality experience
- Learners participating in quality and governance arrangements

What is Partnership and why do we have one?

The terms 'partner' and 'partnership' are all-encompassing terms to indicate the collaborative working relationship between students and staff.

Partnership working is based on the values of:

- openness in all that we say and do
- trust and honesty in our working relationships
- sharing challenges and agreeing goals to overcome them
- celebration of success and support when things are not as successful as planned
- regular meetings during which we consider all points of view

Working in partnership will also enable the College and NCLSA to meet the strategic objectives of the Learner Engagement and Support Strategy. These include:

- Maintaining links with local schools to assist with transition to college.
- Activities are delivered that establish relationships pre-admission.
- Ensuring learners partake in a comprehensive induction programme to college.
- Providing comprehensive support services.
- Recognising and celebrating success of learners.
- Ensure development opportunities are provided via the Be Engaged programme.
- Learners who undertaken sparqs training to become Institutional Associate Trainers (IATs) are enabled to make positive contributions to evaluation of the learning experience.
- Pastoral and emotional support to sustain learners during times of difficulty
- Provide ongoing support during transition planning and UCAS application.
- Provide early intervention in relation to attendance that supports learners remain on course.
- Widen the range of relevant extracurricular activities designed to enhance the learner experience.
- Provide resources and links that will enable learners to access additional services to support mental health and wellbeing.
- Provide effective service, supervision and infrastructure to ensure optimal service delivery.
- Student President makes positive contribution to the discussion at Board meetings.

- Review of Partnership agreement to ensure agreed priorities for the future are established to promote bond between NCLSA and the College.
- SMT receiving learner feedback from events such as Be Heard and learner surveys that will lead to improvements in within the college.
- Involving learners in the review and evaluation of key services which lead to improvements that will directly benefit learners.

The Partnership Agreement is comprised of two sections. Part A outlines how learners can participate in NCLSA's and the College's structures to influence and make a change within the College.

Part B details the annual priorities that have been agreed between the Regional Board, College and NCLSA.

Part A

Learner representation

New College Lanarkshire recognises the importance of learners being involved in decisions at all levels of the College and making sure all learners have the best experience possible. The College and NCLSA will work together to ensure:

- That learners are represented by a students' association elected representative on college committees and Board of Management.
- That learner representatives are able to access support, if they wish, to assist them with their work on these committees and are able to represent learners' views and interests effectively.
- All full-time courses has a class representative and if possible a depute to make sure that learners' views on their course, tutorials, or any other part of the College experience are listened to and acted upon by staff where necessary.
- All fulltime courses will have at least three Course Team Meetings a year which will include the class representatives as per the Course Review and Evaluation Procedure

Learners shaping life at the College

Learner involvement in decision-making is key to creating the best possible learner experience. At New College Lanarkshire there are lots of ways that learners can help shape College life. These include:

- Standing for election as a member of the NCLSA Executive (paid full-time, paid part-time or voluntary roles within the Association).
- Participate in SAINTs programme (Student Association in-team support) within the College.
- Standing for election as a Class Representative.
- Speaking to their Lecturer, Curriculum and Quality Leader, or support service provider directly
- Giving honest, constructive feedback by taking part in feedback surveys, Be Heard events, Stop and Review focus groups, and any other feedback processes that take place.
- Sharing their point of view with their course representative so that it can be considered during the course review and evaluation process.

Part B

Progress on the New College Lanarkshire and New College Lanarkshire Students' Association Student Partnership Agreement will be provided to Lanarkshire Regional Board and Senior Management Team on a bi-annual basis.

In response to both student feedback and the desire to further progress existing initiatives the College and NCLSA agree, on behalf of the wider community, to work together on a number of topics as outlined below:

Student Health and Wellbeing

The College and NCLSA agree to explore ways of developing and/or signposting to services that will enhance student health and well-being. This will be achieved by:

- Raising awareness of support services available within New College Lanarkshire
- Hosting events and inviting external organisations into the College that can support students with health issues.
- Undertake training that will enhance the skills to support students with health issues.
- Building upon the work undertaken to make progress using the Healthy Body Healthy Mind Award scheme.

Gender Action Plan

New College Lanarkshire and NCLSA recognises that there is gender imbalance in certain college subjects and programmes. This issue is not unique to the College, however ambitious action is required to address this. As a contributor to the Gender Action Plan, NCLSA have a commitment to:

- Participate in unconscious bias training.
- Attend relevant events organised by SFC, Equate, sparqs and NUS Scotland to inspire and empower women students in areas where they are under-represented.
- Actively engage with male students to obtain their views and participate in events to ensure they do not disengage with college life.
- Conduct single sex focus groups with students with the purpose of tackling gender underrepresentation.
- Conduct a roundtable discussion of students and staff where staff can hear first-hand from students studying subjects in which their gender is under-represented.
- Work in-partnership to increase awareness of the need to raise any concerns students have in relation to sexual harassment and the importance of having this logged so appropriate actions can be taken.

Improving Communication and Representation

New College Lanarkshire and NCLSA recognises the importance of students being involved in decision making and evaluation of College life. In 2018/19, New College Lanarkshire and NCLSA will work together to:

- Select and ensure training for Institutional Associate Trainers, who will in turn support the Class Representatives.
- Organise student surveys, Be Heard events, and Stop and Review focus groups.
- Ensure student feedback is included within the How Good is our College self-evaluation.
- Ensure students are consulted before changes to services or college projects that will impact on student social spaces and resources.

Overall

Lanarkshire Regional Board, New College Lanarkshire and NCLSA also agree to work together to investigate and address any issues arising from learner feedback as required throughout the year. New College Lanarkshire will ensure that NCLSA has the support required to fulfil their role, and NCLSA agrees to fulfil this role, making the learner voice heard.
